  - Go to CaliforniaColleges.edu
  - In the top right corner, click "Register Your Account"
  - Select "I am a Parent/Guardian" from the dropdown menu
  - Put in the name of your child's school district (Irvine Unified School District)
  - Type in the name of your student's school (University High School)
  - Put in your student's information
    - First and Last Name
    - DOB
    - Student ID Number
  - Check the box that says you're a certified parent and click "next"
  - Once you register your account, you'll be brought to the family dashboard and you're good to go
  - On the Family Dashboard, there is an option to add another student (for siblings)

#### **Comprehensive Review Factors**

- 1) GPA Weighted, academic GPA in all completed "a-g" courses (10-11<sup>th</sup> grade for eligibility)
- QUALITY OF COURSES Number of, content of and performance in academic courses beyond the minimum "a-g" requirements
- 3) HONORS & AP COURSES Number of and performance in UC-approved honors and APs
- 4) **ELC** Identification by UC as being ranked in the top 9 percent of your high school class at the end of your junior year (Eligible in the Local Context, or ELC)
- 5) **SENIOR YEAR COURSES** Quality of your senior-year program as measured by the type and number of academic courses in progress or planned
- 6) **QUALITY OF ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE** relative to the educational opportunities available in your high school
- 7) OUTSTANDING ACADEMIC PERFORMANCES in one or more academic subject areas
- 8) OUTSTANDING WORK in one or more special projects in any academic field of study
- 9) **IMPROVEMENT** Recent, marked improvement in academic performance as demonstrated by academic GPA and the quality of coursework completed or in progress
- 10) **SPECIAL TALENTS, ACHIEVEMENTS, AWARDS** in a particular field, such as visual and performing arts, communication or athletic endeavors; special skills, such as demonstrated written and oral proficiency in other languages; special interests, such as intensive study and exploration of other cultures; experiences that demonstrate unusual promise for leadership, such as significant community service or significant participation in student government; or other significant experiences or achievements that demonstrate the student's promise for contributing to the intellectual vitality of a campus
- 11) **SPECIAL PROJECTS** Completion of special projects undertaken in the context of your high school curriculum or in conjunction with special school events, projects or programs
- 12) **OVERCOMING SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES** Academic accomplishments in light of your life experiences and special circumstances
- 13) LOCATION of your secondary school and residence

<u>Recommendations</u> - If required by schools students are applying to, students will need to fill out a **Counselor Recommendation Packet** (will be available on the Class of 2026 Canvas Page) and request a letter of recommendation from teachers (give advanced notice and ask what materials they need)

## **College Admission Testing**

- SAT/ACT Testing
  - UC & Cal State schools are testblind

 Most private schools are testoptional: Check school websites for current information

## Preparing for College and Career in Junior Year: What Parents Can do

- Encourage your student to continue focusing on academic classes
- Support your student's extracurricular activities and encourage them to explore and pursue their interests
- If your child is an athlete being recruited to four year colleges, register with the NCAA online (www.eligibilitycenter.org) and check courses to make sure he/she is NCAA eligible
- Begin to discuss senior year class schedule
  - Review transcript with your student and ensure he/she finishes all requirements
  - Consider ROP and dual enrollment classes
  - Remind your student to maintain strong academic courses through their senior year
  - Help your student determine if standardized testing is needed/helpful for the spring of junior year
    - UC and Cal State schools are test blind
    - Check websites for out of state or private schools to determine if standardized testing is necessary
- Encourage your student to research college and careers
  - Discuss your student's interests, abilities and preferences
  - Utilize college resources (CaliforniaColleges.edu, College & Career Center website)
  - Remember that fit is the most important factor
  - o If possible, visit college campuses or do virtual tours of schools of interest
