UNI High School Graduation Requirements

All students must complete 215 credits including the following with a “D” or better:

- A. **History** – 3 years (30 credits): Global Perspectives, US History and Political Science/Economics
- B. **English** – 4 years (40 credits)
- C. **Math** - 2 years (20 credits) including Math I
- D. **Science** – 2 years (20 credits)
- E. **World Language OR Visual/Performing Art** – 1 year (10 credits)
- F. **Physical Education** – 2 years (20 credits)
- G. **Health** – 1 semester (5 credits)

UC/CSU College Eligibility Course Requirements

“A – G” MINIMUM Subject Requirements for CSU and UC schools

All students required to complete the following with a “C” or higher to be *eligible*:

- A. **History** - 2 years including:
 - 1 year of World History (Global)
 - 1 year of US History or ½ a year of US History and ½ a year of Political Science
- B. **English** – 4 years required of College Preparatory (CP) English
- C. **Mathematics** – 3 years required, 4 recommended including:
 - 1 year of Math I, 1 year of Math II & 1 year of Math III
- D. **Science** – 2 years of laboratory science required (1 year Life Sci. & 1 year Physical Sci.) 3 years recommended:

<u>CSU:</u> 1 year of Earth Systems Science 1 year of Biology	<u>UC:</u> 1 year of Biology 1 year of Advanced Science (Chemistry, Physics, APES)

- E. **World Language** – 2 years required, 3 recommended
- F. **Visual or Performing Art** – 1 year required
 1 yearlong Visual or Performing Art course
 (Examples: Dance, Drama, Art, Music, etc.)
- G. **College Preparatory Elective** – 1 year required
 1 year in addition to those required in “A – F.”
 (Examples: History, Social Science, Math, World Language, etc.)

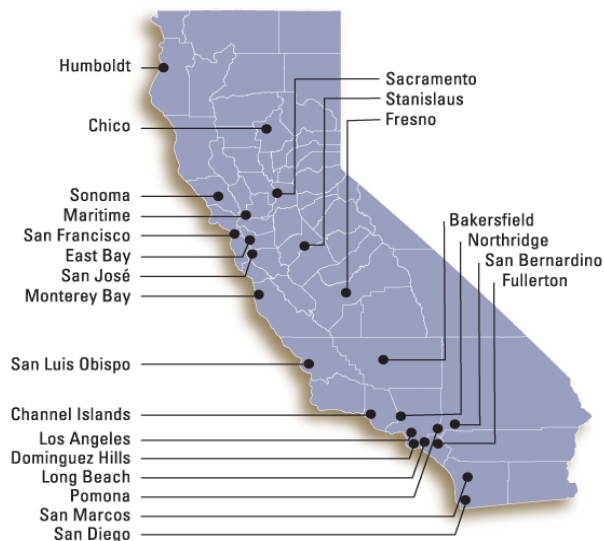

Preparing for College and Career – Junior Year

What PARENTS Can Do:

1. Encourage your student to continue focusing on academic classes.
2. Support your student's extracurricular activities. Encourage to explore and pursue interests.
3. If your student is an athlete being recruited to 4-Year Colleges: Register with the NCAA online (www.eligibilitycenter.org) and check courses to make sure he/she is NCAA eligible.
4. Begin to discuss senior year class schedule:
 - Review transcripts with your student and ensure he/she finishes all requirements
 - Consider Regional Occupational Program (ROP) classes
 - Remind your student to maintain strong academic courses
5. Help your student prepare for College Entrance Exams this Spring:
 - ACT or SAT - Discuss what date he/she will take exam and sign-up online ASAP. We recommend testing in the Spring of Junior year – see dates above. Students can re-test in Fall 2016.
 - SAT Subject Exams – Optional for UC admission. We still recommend taking Subject exams as each private school has different requirements; please double check with admissions websites. Sign-up online ASAP.
6. Research colleges and careers:
 - Discuss your student's interests, abilities and preferences.
 - Utilize college resources (Naviance, online resources, College & Career Center)
 - **Remember the fit is the most important factor.**
 - Visit colleges and take campus tours (during Spring Break or Summer)
7. Discuss the cost of college and encourage him/her to start researching and applying for scholarships that are available. Have your student visit the College & Career Center website for more scholarship information.
8. Help your student plan summer activities: volunteer work, internships, jobs, community college classes, college visits, etc. Students can also begin brainstorming college essays, creating a resume, or starting Counselor Recommendation packets.
